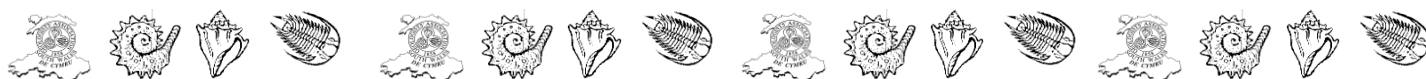
### Geology Rocks – 23rd February 2013

## Getting to know your committee

*Here is the first in an occasional series of profiles about members of the Group's committee. It is an opportunity to learn a little more about the people who work hard to keep the group active and interesting. I hope you enjoy it. This first article is about our current President, Geraint Owen.*

It scares me to remind myself, but I joined the Geologists' Association South Wales Group back in 1984, when I started lecturing in the geology department at University College Swansea. I joined the committee as Field Excursions Secretary in 1989 and took over from Alun Thomas as Secretary in 1990. Alun had held that post since 1966 and was impossible to replace, particularly in terms of his meticulous record-keeping. Although I seemed to remain as Secretary for far longer than I should have, I only served 19 years, passing the job in 2009 to the far more capable hands of Lynda Garfield. My period as Secretary saw big changes for the Group, with a move to charitable status, a big increase in membership and a broadening of activities. Since then, there were a couple of days when I was not on the committee, but after being awarded Honorary Membership in 2009 – a very great honour indeed – I was elected President for two years from March 2012.

In the meantime, University College Swansea had morphed into Swansea University and Geology had disappeared as a department, but I continued to teach geology within the Department of Geography. I really enjoy teaching students and am delighted that I now teach a second-year course and a dedicated degree scheme that recognises the study of geology alongside physical geography. Last summer I had the wonderful experience of escorting 10 undergraduate students to the Colorado Plateau to undertake geological fieldwork on the amazing Navajo Sandstone for their geography dissertations. I enjoy giving talks about geology and leading field trips for all sorts of groups, and am always amazed by how much interest and enthusiasm there is "out there" for geology, and how lucky I am to have a job that pays me to be a geologist! I'm particularly proud to have been one of the authors – with Steve Howe and Tom Sharpe – of the Group's award-winning publication "Walking the Rocks" and hope there will be more of the type to follow.

Within geology, I'm a clastic sedimentologist, studying the conditions under which rocks like sandstone formed. To be more specific, I study soft-sediment deformation structures; structures formed by the disturbance of near-surface sediment, often as a result of earthquakes, and then preserved in sandstones. I gave a talk about it to the Group many years ago, and I can still see the glazed eyes and hear the snores! In the last few years, my study of soft-sediment deformation has taken me to the Colorado Plateau, Death Valley and southern Italy, as well as NW Scotland and other parts of Britain. I love travelling and exploring new places and feel privileged as a geologist to be able to find so much of interest in the world around us.
