



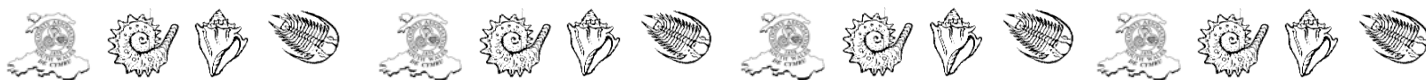

Field Meetings 2008

The beginnings of geological map-making in Britain 200 years ago were fraught for the men behind them. Smith struggled to make a living as he worked singlehandedly to produce his map of the strata of England and Wales. He saw it published and then rapidly overtaken by the corporate venture of the new Geological Society. To cap it all, he found himself sent to prison. MacCulloch, on the other hand, had the advantage of a Government expense account while mapping Scotland, but became embroiled in financial disputes and personal jealousies, and even threatened to shoot himself. His map was not published until after he had died. In this talk we will look at the people, the

We will be concentrating on the Gashes at Trevallen, Bullslaughter Bay and Flimston, with incidental references to other aspects of the local geology.

Sunday 9th March

The Gash Breccias of the Pembroke Syncline

Meet at 10:00am at the National Trust car park at Lydstep (SS 088 977)

(Car park is accessed down a rutted narrow lane leading south from Lydstep village about 100 m beyond the Lydstep Tavern as one drives towards Pembroke). No toilet there.

We will be concentrating on the Lydstep Point, Whitesheet Rock and Draught Outliers, with passing reference to other aspects of local geology. Depending on numbers attending, their willingness to participate at a cost not less than £10 per head, the availability of the craft and the total price, Peter will investigate the possibility of doing a rhib run from Tenby Harbour late in the afternoon into Caldey Sound in order to investigate the spectacular Lydstep Point, Valleyfield Top, St. Margaret's Point and Den Point Outliers and the intraformational Asbian palaeokarst at Proud Giltar, none of which can be accessed easily from the mainland (dependant on weather and numbers)

Please bring: Safety gear - we will be working under rock overhangs and in caves.

Packed lunches - we simply have to make best use of tidal conditions (though we know of all the local pubs and tea-shops in an emergency). **Binoculars** - much important detail inaccessible high up in 50 m high cliffs. 1:50K G.S. Pembroke and Linney Head map and 1:25K O.S. South Pembrokeshire Explorer **maps** if you have them.

It is hoped to make these excursions more like undergraduate field tutorials than Cook's tours - we will point out various puzzling features and ask you to explain them. If you attended Peter's talk in Cardiff in October, you will know what to expect! (Of course, it is not necessary to have done so to attend these field meetings) No two gashes are alike, so it is not necessary to attend both days. The only feature common to both

will be a short introductory chat to explain the fundamental problems associated with the Gashes - no-one knows how old they are and there are 101 hypotheses to explain their origins - and what the Gash Breccia Research Group is trying to do to solve them. The trips will terminate either when the leaders get tired, dusk or if Wales are playing in the 6-Nations on either day, whichever earlier. ***SWGA Coordinator for this event is Rhian (07963 732276). If you intend attending either or both of these day, it would be helpful if you let us know.***
