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

Forty-ninth Session 2007-2008

Welcome to the Autumn/winter season of our forty-ninth session. We have had a very successful summer programme, despite the weather. We visited Clearwell and Tintern to see Carboniferous limestones, the Tywi Lineament for volcanic landscapes of the Ordovician. Back to the Carboniferous to see the Coal Measures and Millstone Grits at Nant Helen and Pontneddfechan. The Middle Usk Valley trip examined glacial landforms, whilst the Westbury trip had us rummaging, enthusiastically, for vertebrate fossils at this famous site. Sedimentology at Ogmere by Sea and Nash gave a fascinating insight into previously unnoticed features of this familiar site.

We have one more meeting left of our field programme this will be on **Saturday 27th October 2007. The geology and scenery of the Carboniferous rocks of the Tenby area. It's a full day, lead by Sid Howells (Countryside Council for Wales)**

Meet at 10.30am at the Butts Field car park, Tenby (SN 132 032). This excursion gives us the opportunity to study various aspects of the Carboniferous Limestone and Millstone Grit sequences at Tenby. Aspects of structural and engineering geology (coastal protection) will also be covered. This is an excursion by foot and will involve a walk of several miles with some moderate gradients on beach, rocky shore and coast path.

The Gash Breccia Problem

Joint meeting with the Russell Society

The Gash Breccias contained in the Carboniferous Limestone of the Pembroke Peninsula are a problem because there are serious objections to the interpretations about their mode of origin in the only two extensive previous studies - by Ernest Dixon (1921) and Trevor Thomas (1971). The former thought that they were the products of cave roof collapse, the latter that they were tectonic breccias. Furthermore, while many accept that they

are of Triassic age, on account of the red sediment often present in the breccia interstices, this has never been confirmed and, theoretically, they could be of any age from Mississippian to Pliocene. Previous notions about their age and origins are reconsidered and some new ideas will be discussed.

John MacCulloch and William Smith: the men and their maps. Tom Sharpe

The beginnings of geological map-making in Britain 200 years ago were fraught for the men behind them. Smith struggled to make a living as he worked single-handedly to produce his map of the strata of England and Wales. He saw it published and then rapidly overtaken by the corporate venture of the new Geological Society. To cap it all, he found himself sent to prison. MacCulloch, on the other hand, had the advantage of a Government expense account while mapping Scotland, but became embroiled in financial disputes and personal jealousies, and even threatened to shoot himself. His map was not published until after he had died. In this talk we will look at the people, the personalities and the remarkable stories behind these first maps.
